## Housing Stability for Children

A lack of affordable housing options means children may be exposed to unsafe housing or even may experience homelessness.

As shown in Table 1 below, 531 children in Ulster County public schools experienced homelessness in the 2020-2021 school year.

Most children who experience homelessness in Ulster County are "doubled up" in a relative or friend's home, and a smaller portion live in a hotel or motel or live in a shelter.<sup>1</sup> While less common, some homeless children in New York may also live in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, train stations, or similar places.<sup>11</sup>

Children who experience housing instability and homelessness are much more likely to suffer from health and behavioral problems,<sup>iii iv</sup> move from one school to another, have poor school attendance,<sup>v</sup> be challenged to keep up with schoolwork and learning,<sup>vivii</sup> and have a higher risk of dropping out.



## UNSAFE HOUSING CONDITIONS

When affordable housing options are limited, households are often forced to live in substandard housing because it is all they can afford. For children this often means home is an unsafe place where they may be exposed to toxins like leadbased paint and asbestos, a leaky roof, broken windows, pests and rodents, nonfunctioning heating or cooling systems, hazardous electrical wiring, and unsanitary conditions.

The toxins that children are exposed to in poor quality housing such as leadbased paint are known to cause developmental delays and permanent brain damage.<sup>viii</sup> Nationally, at least 4.2% of children who test have elevated lead levels.<sup>ix</sup> Children of lower socioeconomic status and children of color experience higher rates of lead poisoning.<sup>x</sup> Households with lower incomes often do not have a choice but to remain in a home even after children have tested positive for elevated lead levels.

## MORE AFFORDABLE HOUSING BENEFITS CHILDREN

Households that have access to stable, safe, and affordable housing are better positioned to live healthy and happy lives. A safe place to call home is a key part of giving children a strong foundation on which to build their lives.
